Fall of 2021 - Whew!

Isn't it amazing that when things seem to be falling apart, we find that God has another plan for us? *The Prayer Center experienced that last fall.* A few things happened that tested our fortitude.

Our bed ministry needed re-evaluation. We had to close it down for a time in order to build it back up. We have some new people in place to help with deliveries along with some who have been with us for awhile. It has taken some effort, but we slowly got back into a routine.

Two of our employees contracted Covid at the same time and were off work for two weeks. That put us behind on the **Adopt-A-Family for Christmas** program as well as the bed ministry. The Lord was reigning supreme as people stepped up to "adopt" – 27 families adopted along with more families adopted by **St. John** in **Fenton**.

We were able to help about 15 families who came to our "Shop4Kids" outreach from new toys that had been donated. These are families who were too late in signing up with any agency for help and was in need gifts for their children.

Thanks to all those who shopped, wrapped, and brought gifts in. May your blessings abound!

Director Deb stepped in to handle both the bed ministry and the food pantry duties. She continued to work at those while developing the new bed ministry system.

Just as we were getting the bed ministry going again, another of our workers contracted Covid. That put us behind again.

In the midst of the other trials, we were broken into. One of the French doors was completely broken out and the other one was severly twisted. Some damage was done inside but the alarm must have scared them off before they could do too much damage. Again we were blessed with donations towards the replacement/repair of the French doors.

Throughout this topsy, turvy time, we know the **Lord** was with us every step of the way. When it looked like things were falling apart, a light appeared and in *His grace and mercy*, the difficult path was overcome.
